Summary of “The Girl” by O. Henry

QUESTION 4

Title: The Proposal

Author: Anton Chekhov

Genre: One-act farce (comedy)

Setting: The drawing room of Stepan Stepanovitch Chubukov's house in Russia

Main Characters

1. Stepan Stepanovitch Chubukov – A landowner, Natalia's father. He is friendly at first but short-tempered and greedy.
2. Natalia Stepanovna – Chubukov's 25-year-old daughter. She is intelligent, strong-willed, and argumentative.
3. Ivan Vassilevitch Lomov – A 35-year-old neighbor of Chubukov. He is nervous, fussy, and comes to propose marriage to Natalia.

Detailed Summary

1. Lomov's Visit

The play begins with Lomov visiting his neighbor Chubukov. He is dressed formally and seems anxious. Chubukov welcomes him warmly, thinking he has come to borrow money. But Lomov says he has come to ask for Natalia's hand in marriage.

Chubukov is delighted and gives him permission to speak to Natalia. He believes that this marriage will unite their lands and bring prosperity to both families.

2. The Argument about Land

When Natalia enters, Lomov tries to start the proposal but is too nervous. Instead of confessing his love, he starts talking about their neighboring lands — Oxen Meadows.

He says Oxen Meadows belong to him.

Natalia gets angry and insists the land belongs to her family.

The discussion soon turns into a heated quarrel, with both shouting and accusing each other's families of lying. Chubukov enters and joins the fight, supporting his daughter.

Lomov becomes so nervous that his heart starts racing, and he almost faints.

Lomov leaves in anger.

3. The Argument about Dogs

After Lomov leaves, Chubukov tells Natalia that Lomov had actually come to propose marriage.

Natalia feels shocked and regrets fighting with him. She immediately asks her father to bring him back.

When Lomov returns, Natalia tries to calm him down. But soon, they begin arguing again, this time about whose dog is better — Lomov's dog Guess or Natalia's dog Squeezer.

The argument becomes so heated that Lomov again falls into a fainting fit.

4. The Proposal (Finally!)

Chubukov enters and sees the chaos. He quickly grabs Lomov's hand and joins it with Natalia's, shouting that they are now engaged.

Natalia and Lomov still continue to argue — even after getting engaged!

Chubukov ends the play

QUESTION 5

Title: Invictus

Poet: William Ernest Henley

Meaning of the title: Invictus is a Latin word that means "unconquered" or "undefeated."

Theme: Courage, self-belief, and inner strength in the face of suffering.

Summary (in detail)

The poem "Invictus" expresses the poet's bravery and determination despite great suffering. William Ernest Henley wrote it while recovering from a serious illness that caused the loss of one of his legs. Even in pain, he refused to lose hope or give up.

Stanza 1

> Out of the night that covers me,
Black as the pit from pole to pole,
I thank whatever gods may be
For my unconquerable soul.

The poet begins by describing his life as surrounded by darkness — like a deep black night covering the whole world. This "darkness" represents pain, suffering, and hard times.

Even in this dark situation, he thanks the gods (or fate) for giving him an "unconquerable soul" — a strong spirit that cannot be defeated.

Stanza 2

> In the fell clutch of circumstance
I have not winced nor cried aloud.
Under the bludgeonings of chance
My head is bloody, but unbowed.

Here, the poet says that life's difficulties and fate's cruel grip have hurt him, but he never cried or complained. Even though he has suffered and been beaten down by life ("my head is bloody"), he has never bowed down in surrender ("but unbowed").

This shows his courage and resilience.

Stanza 3

> Beyond this place of wrath and tears

Looms but the Horror of the shade,
And yet the menace of the years
Finds, and shall find, me unafraid.

The poet says that even death and the unknown future cannot frighten him. He accepts that life is full of pain ("wrath and tears") and that death ("the Horror of the shade") is waiting, but he will still face it without fear.

Stanza 4

> It matters not how strait the gate,
How charged with punishments the scroll,
I am the master of my fate,
I am the captain of my soul.

In the final stanza, the poet says that no matter how difficult life's path is ("how strait the gate") or how strict fate may seem, he alone controls his destiny. He declares proudly:

> "I am the master of my fate,
I am the captain of my soul."
